



THE 1864 STORY

Tanjong Pagar, now famed for its range of dining options, cocktail joints, and majestic cultural monuments, was once a fishing village in the 1830s. It was only with the founding of the Tanjong Pagar Dock Company in 1864 that transformed the district into a prosperous hub port. Named after the year Tanjong Pagar Dock Company was founded, 1864 serves to bring guests on an immersive voyage through five key ports located along the Maritime Silk Road in this craft cocktail menu. Each of the 15 cocktails on the menu are imbued with flavours that pay respect to the heritage and culture of the ports in centuries past.

ITALY

TIRAMISÙ | \$25

Rény Martin VSOP, Frangelico, Vanilla Syrup, Cream, Espresso, Cocoa Powder

Tastes just like dessert! The word Tiramisù literally means "pick me up". It was an aphrodisiac dessert from the 19th century that is typically offered at the end of the evening to reinvigorate men for their conjugal duties back home.

INOCULATION | \$25

Bulleit Rye Bourbon, Mancino Rosso, Cherry Syrup, Chocolate Bitters

Inspired by the perfect summer treat, Gelato was created in a contest for the greatest frozen dessert in Florence by a chicken farmer named Ruggieri in the 16th century. The combination of sweet fruit juice and ice even won the heart of Caterina de Medici, an Italian noblewoman, who had him make his specialty at her wedding to the then future King of France.

LITTLE RED PLUMBER | \$25

Four Pillar Shiraz, Mancino Rosso, Cynar, Rhubarb Bitters, Champagne

An ode to the famous Italian negroni. Legend has it that the Negroni was invented in Florence, Italy in 1919, when a patron who had picked up a taste for strong liquor while working as a rodeo clown in the Wild West requested for a stiffer riff on the classic Americano cocktail.

CHINA

桃花香 TÁO HUÀ XIANG | \$25

Hendrick's Gin, St-Germain Elderflower Liqueur, Cherry Blossom Syrup, Cloudy Apple Juice, Cranberry Juice, Pink Salt

A beloved subject in painting and poetry, Plum blossoms are a symbol of endurance in the Chinese culture. They are very resilient flowers that come to life even at the coldest time of the year, and its popularity can be traced back to the Tang dynasty from the 618 to 906 AD.


Botanist Gin, Mancino Rosso, Fernet-Branca, Orange Bitters

One of the oldest recreational drugs, China was once a great market for Opium, a highly addictive narcotic. Approximately 2% of the country's male population is hooked on Opium, and it was crucial to the country's trade in centuries past. So crucial was it that it led to two opium wars waged against China - first by Britain, and subsequently by Britain and France.

Jiang Xiao Bai, Chrysanthemum Vodka, Cherry Blossom Syrup, Lemon Juice, Mint Bitters

A spiritual stone favoured by the Chinese, Jade was regarded as the most precious stone in ancient China, and held in higher esteem than gold or jewels. It is believed to have originated from the super natural, born by the forces of streams and mountains, and endowed with transcendental qualities.



KENYA

JUNGLE DISCO | \$25

Rény Martin VSOP, Amaraula, Crème de Menthe, Cardamom Bitters, Milk, Sweet and Sour Mix

A tribute to nature's epic masterpiece, Kenya is one of the revered safari destinations in Africa. It is known for its abundant wildlife and the great annual migration.

CAFFE NOIR | \$25

Mezcal Tequila, Kahula, Amaraula, Agave Syrup, Espresso

Coffee at sundown? Kenya sits next to coffee's birthplace, Ethiopia, but it took a thousand years for coffee to make it across the border. While French missionaries first brought Bourbon to Kenya in 1891, it was under British colonial rule that coffee cultivation spread in the 1900s. Today, many people would list Kenyan coffee among the five best in the world. With its rich body, intense acidity, and delightful aroma, it should be no wonder.

SUGAR RUSH | \$25

Maracatu Cachaca, Lime Juice, Sugarcane Syrup, Tonic Water

Refreshing beverage for the common man. The sugarcane industry is of great economical importance in Kenya. There are about 20,000 sugarcane farmers who supply most of the canes milled in Kenya, and the industry supports the livelihoods of approximately six million Kenyans.

TIPSY CURRY | \$25

Bacardi Carta Blanca, Malibu, Curry Powder, Lime Juice, Pineapple Juice

A spice with an ancient history, Curry is believed to have originated 4,000 years ago in the ancient Indus Valley empire of India. The word "curry" however, was invented by the British when India was under colonial rule. Like many things, curry's journey to various regions across the world can be traced back to colonialism where it was used as a flavour disguise for old meat and vegetables.

INDIA

MASALA CHAI | \$25

Myer's Dark Rum, Campari Infusion, Yuzu Juice, Chai Tea, Cardamom Bitters

Homage to the Indian tea beverage, The origins of masala chai date back thousands of years to where an ancient king who presided over what is now India, used to sip a brewed concoction of spices to remain alert through long court sessions. There are also records of the beverage being used as a remedy for mild ailments and served as a welcome drink to guests. The drink was caffeine-free and it was only in 1835 that the British introduced black tea leaves to the invention.

HOLY SMOKES | \$25

Kraken Spiced Rum, Cane Sugar, Angostura Bitters

Veneration for fire, Hindus make up 80% of the Indian population. The Hindu fire ritual is a sacred ceremony performed at all major phases of life including birth, coming of age, weddings, funerals, and religious holidays.

SINGAPORE

ONDEH ONDEH | \$25

Brown Sugar Infused Vodka, Malibu, Gula Melaka, Pandan Syrup, Coconut Juice

A story that spans decades, In Singapore, close to 80% of the population are ethnically Chinese. Among the Chinese, the Peranakans (mixed Chinese and Malay Indonesian heritage) were pioneers in business and government as they spoke English well and could act as middlemen in the then colonial society. An outstanding feature of Peranakan culture is the cuisine, and in particular, Nyonya kuehs, named after the ladies who make them.

SINGAPORE UNSLING | \$25

Monkey 47, Raspberry Liqueur, Cherry Blossom Syrup, Apple Juice, Lemon Juice

The greenest city in the world, Singapore is home to two renowned gardens. One of them is the Singapore Botanic Gardens, which is the first and only tropical garden on the UNESCO's World Heritage List, and the other is Gardens by the Bay, which is home to a diverse collection of over 1.5 million plants that hail from every continent except Antarctica.

KAYA ON ICE | \$25

Ketel One Vodka, Peach Liqueur, Lychee Syrup, Kaya

A household staple, Kaya on toast is believed to be created by Hainanese immigrants who served onboard British ships during the colonial times. It was a replacement for western fruit jams and has now become a popular breakfast dish served that has been integrated into the coffee shop culture in Singapore.
